


A Bit of History

I find old maps absolutely fascinating and around Elkstones we still have the remains and even some records of old properties which have disappeared since the maps were published. And quite a few properties which are not shown on those Maps. There is a large collection (unfortunately incomplete) of old OS Maps in the National Library of Scotland - http://maps.nls.uk/geo/find/#zoom=6&lat=53.3995&lon=-3.0305&layers=39&point=-1.9538,53.0377

This OS Map surveyed in 1878 still shows a ford and footbridge down at the bottom of the Clough and the 1919 Revision shows several more properties such as Heath House and the Village School.

Just above Cow Hays on Stoneyfold Lane is (or was) Moorside which is not named on this map but is shown on others – it is now derelict but some of the residents are shown in the Churchyard Catalogue and one of their descendants still lives at Reapsmoor....
