### A Piece of History for Elkstones

We had a lovely service to mark **Remembrance Day** on the 13<sup>th</sup> November & Elkstones was honoured to have been chosen to become part of the story of the **WW1 Battle of Verdun**. The vicar Fr. John told us how, after the Battle of Verdun, which was fought over 302 days in 1916 by the French who were holding out against the German invaders, there were **only two trees left standing alive** on the battlefield, **an oak & a horse chestnut**. The British allies fought the Battle of the Somme partly to draw pressure away from Verdun, in order to bring some relief to the French defenders. A very costly sacrifice, as the loss of British lives was enormous.

After the war ended, **the Mayor of Verdun sent a bag of acorns & horse chestnuts from these trees to Britain** as a thank you. Of these, one was planted at Sandringham by Queen Mary, two were planted at Kew Botanical Gardens & the rest were distributed around the country to individuals, groups & organisations in return for a donation to the War Seal Foundation, a charity set up by Sir Oswald Stoll to build self-contained homes for returning soldiers, with medical facilities on site. (The charity still exists, with the same aims, but is now called the Sir Oswald Stoll Foundation). Lichfield received an acorn & the tree grown from it is now over 100 years old.

In 2020 Paul Niven, Lichfield District Council's Community Gardener, **collected acorns from this tree** & grew saplings from them, which were given out to a number of churches & schools in the Lichfield Diocese.

The vicar received a sapling for our Parish & chose to bring it to Elkstones, partly because it should have a good chance in our quiet graveyard of growing undisturbed for long enough for it to become established. In time it will become a unique outdoor War Memorial & eventually there will be a plaque to explain its origins as a grandchild of the Verdun Oak.

At the end of our Remembrance Service, the sapling was planted in the lower section of the churchyard by the vicar's brother Michael.

Thank you Michael, it was not an easy task digging the hole!
